















FROM OUR CO-PRESIDENTS

COMMUNITY ACTION GRANTS

Through its general fund, the WCF awards Community Action Grants twice a year in the Spring and Fall to support worthy community projects being undertaken by local civic organizations. Projects considered must be for educational, cultural, charitable, or benevolent purposes that benefit the Whitewater community. A total of \$6,750 in Action Grants were awarded in 2022. In addition, because of the ongoing pandemic, in the Fall of 2021, grants totaling \$15,974 were made from a designated COVID Relief Fund established after the onset of the pandemic to assist local civic organizations to assist families to meet their basic needs.

Arboretum at Starin Park - City of Whitewater Park & Recreation's Urban Forestry Commission has received Level 1 Accreditation as an Arboretum at Starin Park from ArbNet, the international accrediting agency for arboreta. The Commission's initial project is to establish an arboretum, or outside museum of trees and shrubs, to provide educational opportunities for children and adults by identifying and preserving a diverse network of native and imported trees and plants. Their goal in the first year is to plant many trees and shrubs native to Wisconsin and tab them with signage that allows visitors to scan the tag to identify and learn about each tree. You can get involved and support this effort by becoming a volunteer Arboretum Steward to help maintain the planted areas and spread the word about the value of native plants to our community.

First Street Pocket Park - The Whitewater Chamber of Commerce and Downtown Whitewater, Inc. were awarded a \$2,000 Community Action Grant for the purchase and installation of outdoor lighting for the First Street Pocket Park (between Main Street and Center Street). Installation of light poles and solar lights across the one block space will create a gathering place for the community both during the day and after dark. They have also applied for a grant from AARP for the purchase of weather resistant outdoor furniture. This will allow the creation of event programming in the space to draw residents and visitors to the Downtown District to foster economic growth and development.






<u>Book Buddies</u> - First English Lutheran Church was awarded a \$740 Community Action Grant to support their "Book Buddies" literacy program which supports parents and teachers in developing children's enthusiasm for reading through working with caring, supportive adult "buddies".

The WCF has a long tradition of providing fiscal sponsorships by acting as a conduit to receive donations for major community projects. The WCF is proud to have been part of successful projects such as Treyton's Field of Dreams, restoration of the Birge Fountain, Friends of the Whitewater Aquatic Center, the Starin Park All-Inclusive Playground, the Arch and the Frawley Family Amphitheater at Cravath Lakefront Park, and The Community Space. This year, Ferradermis, WUSD's robotics team, was added to the list of organizations supported by donations made through the WCF.


